ALBERT HUNT

Old Biggin Hill'ite Albert Hunt died peacefully after a short illness on the 25th March 2012 aged 84 years. He learned to fly with Experimental Flying Group (EFG) during the 1960s and flew regularly 60s & 70s. During this period he was a car dealer and would frequently fly to Southampton Car Auctions to get his stock.

In the late 70s he moved to "the country" where he found he was next to a small, disused, landing strip which he and the late Gordon Jones landed on a couple of times, all highly unofficial it would seem. But in the early 80s the cost of annual medicals and the vastly increased cost of flying compared with the early days caused him to cease flyings and allow his PPL to lapse. At that time, he turned to his other passion - boats - owning several day boats over the years which he'd cruise up and down the river or take to sea when he was feeling more adventurous.

Albert always retained very fond memories of his Biggin Hill days and the many friends he had made there, with whom he always tried to maintain contact. A real gentleman who will be missed by those who knew him in those early days of Biggin Hill.

Albert's funeral will take place at Medway Crematorium, Bluebell Hill (near Rochester airport) at 11:40am on Thursday 5th April, with drinks & sandwiches afterwards at the nearby Robin Hood pub. The family would welcome any old friends at both the service and afterwards.

Should anyone wish to send flowers or donations, these can be arranged via his son Nevil who is contactable via myself. (Nevil also mentioned that if anyone is out flying that morning and fancies diverting via Rochester as a fly-past while they are gathering prior to the service – between 11:20 and 11:40am that would be welcomed!)

He is also survived by his mother, who is well into her eighties, and who lives close by in Cudham. He will be missed by many of us at the airport who worked with him over the years.
