MARCH WEATHER

Somewhat changeable flying conditions this month, varying between beautiful clear and smooth flying conditions, through to excessively high and gusty winds, unfortunately predominantly right across the one remaining runway.

Clubs and private owners certainly have taken full advantage when the conditions have allowed it, to get airborne. By the time you read this, the clocks will have just changed, and we have those much lighter and lengthening evenings. Back, we hope, to Barbecue weather very soon!

BIGGIN HILL R/T PROCEDURES

Following a discussion at the recent Safety and Noise Abatement Board (SANARB) and at the Tenants and Users meeting, the SATCO has drawn our attention to the concerns that R/T procedures and Biggin have become very varied and causing a few problems, particularly during busy periods.

In conjunction with Bill Robinson, the following set of guidelines has been drawn up for use at Biggin to minimise the length of calls, particularly when preparing for and during departures.....

R/T Calls - Assumes Aircraft has been booked out before the call:

Biggin G..... Local / Circuits / Outbound / Taxi (circle the one you need)

ATC RESPONSE: G..... Pass your message

Biggin G...... PPR Numberis a ... at QNH..... Request Taxi

ATC RESPONSE G..... instructions including runway in use and taxying route

(TO BE READ BACK!)

Correct word to use for description of detail

TAXI = only use when moving from one place on the airport to another

CIRCUITS = when intending to fly the circuit pattern

LOCAL = used when the flight is departing the ATZ and will return subsequently without landing elsewhere

DEPARTURE = leaving Biggin to land at another airport INBOUND = arrival at Biggin from another airport

REJOIN = returning to the airfield from a local (non-landing) flight

Note: it is not necessary to add the area when flying local, nor the destination when flying to another airport - that information is already on the ATC strip generated from the PPR request...

Even if PPR has already been obtained, <u>if going first for fuel, that should just be the TAXI</u> <u>request</u> - do not call for the detail until you have restarted at the pumps and are now ready to actually move for that flight

In essence though, the procedure is designed to keep calls as brief as possible, whilst letting others know what type you are, and where on the airport you are.

It is very important not to just launch into the message on the first call as they could be on the phone and not pick up on it all

Thanks for your understanding. As Bill says, this should avoid the frustration of the controller giving full taxying instructions to an aircraft, only to be told that they are taxying to self-refuelling first, or being unable to issue a landing clearance to an aircraft because a lengthy call is started on the first contact.

NEW FEES ETC. AT BIGGIN FOR LIGHT AIRCRAFT

By the time you read this Newsletter, the much publicised new landing fees and restrictions will have come into force.

For small aircraft the minimum published landing fee is now £41 plus VAT. That new rate will also apply to each touch and go if carrying out circuits.

After some discussions however, the airport have agreed that "Biggin Hill based" aircraft that pay monthly on Direct Debit will be eligible for a 10% discount on the standard rates – ie. ± 36.90 plus VAT = ± 44.28 – additionally it was recognised that some pilots, in order to maintain a valid licence, occasionally do need to carry out some circuits. To help with this, the airport has agreed that those same Biggin Hill based aircraft, paying by Direct Debit, will receive a 30% discount on the standard rate – ie. each touch and go will be charged at £28.70 plus VAT = ± 34.44

Additional changes at Biggin Hill, with effect from 1st April, restrict all operations to fully licenced pilots, and will not allow any solo flights by students at the airport – of course, this will not prevent students from flying into and out of Biggin Hill with an instructor.

NEW CHIEF EXECUTIVE AT BIGGIN

As publicised in the last edition of the Newsletter, Biggin Hill Airport's new CEO, David Winstanley, has taken up his position this month.

Many users have had the opportunity of meeting David during this month. Many points of view have been expressed, and David has indicated that hearing these ideas and views from so many has been quite enlightening and useful. Obviously he can't be expected to be able make changes that will satisfy everyone's ideas, but he has shown a willingness to listen, which is a good thing of course. He certainly has shown that he wishes to continue the process of communicating well with users, as indeed did Will Curtis.

We would all like to welcome David to our historic and very famous airport, and hope that he will enjoy his new role here.
