#### JULY WEATHER

The weather in July has, in the main, been good for GA, but unlike the period when we couldn't legally fly and it seemed to be permanently CAVOK, the weather has been significantly more changeable this month, with quite a few days where no GA flying actually took place. This was disappointing as this month permission was granted for GA training flying to recommence. But in fairness, most of us predicted that this would happen!!

As I write this, the weather is perfect and full CAVOK again, so lets hope for a good August.

## **GENERAL AVIATION RESTRICTIONS REMOVED**

As predicted in the last month's Newsletter, the Department for Transport lifted the restrictions on leisure flying and Club and school training flights with effect from Saturday 4<sup>th</sup> July. At last!

There was some confusion at the General Aviation Unit of the CAA, who seemed to be the last to know, and who were quite late informing everyone that their previous total block on flying for the purpose of leisure was now lifted. But they did get there in the end, albeit with quite a bit of external pressure from everyone who had already been informed of this by the DfT and most of the aviation press and AOPA etc.

There are, of course, some sensible restrictions associated with this return to flying, but none are too onerous, and things have been slowly returning to normal – albeit a different "normal" to that that we were all used to.

After such a long break, most people were out of club recency, so the take up has been slower than many of us would like, but we are getting there....

As I write this, the Department of Transport has apparently "recommended" that, although pilots flying light aircraft do not have to wear a face covering whilst flying, it is "recommended" that any passengers do.

This recommendation applies to all passengers, including those on an introductory flight or cost sharing.

Those actually sharing piloting duties, including therefore flight training, don't have to wear face coverings, although the DoT contradict this by saying that all occupants on a light aircraft "should" wear face coverings where social distancing is not possible, as long as it is safe to do so!

## AUGUST BIGGIN HILL POSTED FUEL PRICES

The "posted" Biggin Hill Airport fuel prices, <u>excluding VAT</u>, for the calendar month of August 2020 are:

£1:39.5 per litre for 100LL Avgas if supplied from the Fuel Bowser

(if uplifted using account card or credit card from the Self-Refuel pumps = minus 4p per litre)

£0:50.5 per litre for Jet A1

### BOMBARDIER NEW HANGAR AND FACILITY

As those of us that have been back up to the airport will have seen, the massive new hangar, ramp, and office facilities for Bombardier are now well underway. Situated between the self-refuelling facility and the South-East apron, it makes it obvious why runway 29 was taken away from us all some time back.

But, from the airport's point of view, this is a tremendous achievement to attract such a vast investment to the airport, especially in these difficult times. The presence of such a prestigious manufacturer at Biggin Hill is excellent and can only help to secure the future of Biggin Hill as an airport, albeit only really benefiting business and corporate operators and owners, rather than us mere light aircraft operators. Still, it would appear the ongoing future of our airport as a whole is likely to remain good in the long term...

#### PAMELA ELLES

It was with great sadness that, on 20th July, I received a phone call from Alison McGugan that her mum, old Biggin Hill'ite Pam Elles, passed away on the 19th. Pam, who was known to so many of the Biggin Hill Airport community, would have been 94 on 13th August.

Pam was born in Wrexham, the youngest of three girls. In 1943 she joined the Wrens, where she learnt to drive in military lorries. She had many different roles in the services, one of which included driving British politician and academic Lord Salter around.

In 1949 Pam married former Battle of Britain rear gunner, later navigator and Squadron Leader, Robert McGugan, and they were stationed in various places, including Germany (where daughter Alison was born) and Norway. Their last posting was to RAF Biggin Hill in 1965, where Robert retired from the RAF in 1968.

In 1972, whilst she was a secretary at the Conservative Club, Pam met and married Biggin Hill's well known flying instructor/examiner, Richard Elles.

Pam became well known to most of the airport community, at one point running Biggin Hill Aero Club, which later became a part of Cabair, and she became a very active member of Joe Merchant's Pilots Pals club and bar. A lover of the electronic fruit machine in the bar, Pam was almost a permanent fixture on the machine nightly, cigarette in holder in hand.

She was one of the many people that got together to make the knitted pew kneeling cushions in the RAF St George's Chapel at RAF Biggin Hill.

For many years, Pam and Richard held an annual "Boxing Day" gathering at their Biggin Hill home, that became THE place for all airport users to be every year...

Sadly Richard succumbed to cancer and passed away in 1998 shortly after the September 60's and 70's reunion that actually launched this group, BigginHillReunited, and these monthly newsletters

Eventually, after the Pilots Pals bar closed in 2007, Pam moved up to live close to her daughter and sadly was missed by us all.

Her family funeral is going to be on the 13th August at Greenacres Colney Wood Norwich, at 1pm. The family plan to have it video'd and that will be streamed for those who were unable to attend. Pam will always be remembered by all the regular airport users and bar regulars - sadly missed - R.I.P. Pam

#### MONTHLY NEWS FROM THE CEO's OFFICE

As I write this submission, yet more countries are being placed on the quarantine list and there is the increasing looming risk of a second spike in COVID-19 across Europe. Like many of you, I watch the news and witness the wide-ranging responses to the crisis, some countries appearing to be returning to normality whilst others have not yet passed the peak of the virus. Whilst I am pleased that activity at Biggin Hill is slowly returning to reasonable levels, the impact of the crisis is clearly deepening across the Aviation industry and recent announcements of job losses across several large airports paints a bleak picture.

Notwithstanding this rapidly changing environment, traffic levels at the Airport have increased throughout June and July and in recent weeks we have seen movements beginning to show stronger signs of recovery. That said, movements remain below where we would clearly like them to be and still remain below this time in both 2018 and 2019.

Developments at the Airport continue at pace despite COVID-19 and those of you who have been at the Airport will have seen the new Bombardier construction accelerate and, with the roof supports being put in place, you can see the scale of this development. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all tenants and partners for their continued cooperation and understanding as this development progresses. As mentioned last month, the new ILS will be installed in October and hopefully the ground works for our Hotel will start towards the end of September this year.

Although there are clear signs that lockdown restrictions are easing, the Airport continues to engage with central government, DfT and the CAA regarding quarantine measures. The Airport continues to engage with its customers to ensure they are fully aware of the measures that have been taken to ensure their safety whilst travelling from the Airport.

Finally, I would like to thank those members of the Light Aviation Steering Group who have provided feedback on our current Noise Abatement Procedures and I will be continue to engage as we review our Noise Action Plan.

I would like to end by wishing all the very best in these trying times and hope that you remain safe and well.
