NICK DAVIDSON

It is with sadness I must tell you of the loss of another of our number in January. Nick Davidson, who was just 49 years old and a Captain for British Airways on the Airbus fleet, passed away on the 12th January after a relatively short but serious illness.

Nick was an instructor at Surrey and Kent in the late 80's / early 90's, where he taught such Biggin Hill'ites as Gary Merchant (himself now a Training Captain with Easyjet). He worked under CFI David Bushell who sadly passed away just last month.

After about four years instruction, he moved through the normal ranks followed by so many before him, flying night freight on Bandeirante's from Southen, then flying for Cityflyer on the ATR out of

Gatwick before joining BA in 1998 on the 757 fleet. He also flew the 747. He got his command three years ago and was looking forward to getting back to the 747 as a Captain when his illness was diagnosed. Nick leaves behind his fiancé, Alina.

RON TATE

I have just been informed of the sad loss of another old Biggin Hill'ite, Ron Tate. Ron, who was 83, passed away last Thursday (26th January). He was originally a Paratrooper in the Army and he became involved in flying in 1966. He learnt to fly with 600Sqd Flying Group at Biggin Hill with instructor John Miles, and also with Rex Nicholls. He is survived by his widow, Joan.

Ron's funeral will be held on Monday 13th February 2012 at 11:30am at Tunbridge Wells Crematorium, Benhall Mill Road, TN2 5JJ. Joan has said that she would welcome any airfield friends of Ron who wish to attend on the day. Aged 81 years, he died peacefully at home in St Martin's, Guernsey, with his family around him, after a long illness. Although his wife May died some time before, and he left his four children, Graham, Susan, Russell and Elliot. His funeral was held on the island on 8 September.

The Olympics are bearing down on us and although the Government imposed slot co-ordination rules will give us good, advanced visibility of the entire operation (not something we usually enjoy), we are waiting with anticipation to see how much of the expected deluge of aircraft actually materialise. This sector of the industry is not known for its forward planning, and my challenge is to balance investment in a robust operation with the actual business on the day. I need to hone my gambling skills! The Olympics is a once-in-a-lifetime event for London and is something that we are fully supporting. Moving around London – whether it be by "train, plane or automobile" – is going to be difficult and is going to be part and parcel of the event. Please be assured that any temporary restrictions which have to be imposed are driven by safety considerations above all else, and I will be immensely grateful for everyone's understanding of that. Communication is key and we are working hard to ensure that our resident aircraft and

owners are protected and considered in the overall plans. The fact is that we aren't going to be able to mitigate the imposed restrictions (for instance, slot co-ordination) to a point where it is business as usual for our based aircraft – very little about London or its transport systems will be business as usual - but I hope that we will at least be able to keep you engaged and informed.

Thanks are due to everyone who has supported us so far with our LoCATE@BigginHill initiative. Under this umbrella, we expect the Apprentice scheme to start in May, and this is surely one of the most tangible measures of the contribution of this group of businesses to the community. I am sure that there will be plenty that we will learn from this first course, but it is definitely the right thing to do long term. We are also looking at the options for usage of vacant premises, and provision of a Social Centre remains high on the priority list. With regards to the Hotel, planning permission has been extended and we continue to actively seek a partner in these challenging economic times. These items and many others fall under the LoCATE banner and all support for it is appreciated.

Moving from business to personalities, I know that John and JB wrote a tribute to George Dobson and his respected and appreciated contribution to Biggin Hill over so many years. I didn't have the opportunity to know George very well, but I sense how he was part of the fabric of Biggin, and for that reason, I was glad that we could host his wake. It was great to see so many people paying their respects to him, and just as his family must have been very proud, so was I, that my team wanted to pay him this tribute and did such a good job. We miss seeing George in the terminal every day, but we remember him fondly.

WE WAS BRUNG UP PROPER!! CONGRATULATIONS TO ALL MY FRIENDS WHO WERE BORN IN THE 1940's, 50's, 60's and 70's.

First, we survived being born to mothers who smoked and/or drank Sherry while they carried us and lived in houses made of asbestos...

We ate cupcakes, white bread and real butter, milk from the cow, and drank soft drinks with sugar in it, but we weren't overweight because...... WE WERE ALWAYS OUTSIDE PLAYING!!

We would leave home in the morning and play all day, as long as we were back when the streetlights came on.

No one was able to reach us all day. And we were OK.

We would spend hours building our go-carts out of old prams and then ride down the hill, only to find out we forgot the brakes. We built tree houses and dens and played in river beds with matchbox cars.

We did not have Playstations, Nintendo Wii, X-boxes, no video games at all, no 999 channels on SKY, no video/dvd films, or colour TV no mobile phones, no personal computers, no Internet or Internet chat rooms........WE HAD FRIENDS and we went outside and found them!

We fell out of trees, got cut, broke bones and teeth and there were no Lawsuits from these accidents.

Only girls had pierced ears!

We ate worms and mud pies made from dirt, and the worms did not live in us forever.

You could only buy Easter Eggs and Hot Cross Buns at Easter time....

We were given air guns and catapults for our 10th birthdays,

We rode bikes or walked to a friend's house and knocked on the door or rang the bell, or just yelled for them! Mum didn't have to go to work to help dad make ends meet because we didn't need to keep up with the Jones's!

Not everyone made the rugby/football/cricket/netball team. Those who didn't had to learn to deal with disappointment. Imagine that!! Getting into the team was based on MERIT

Our teachers used to hit us with canes and gym shoes and throw the blackboard rubber at us if they thought we weren't concentrating .. We can string sentences together and spell and have proper conversations because of a good, solid three R's education.

Our parents would tell us to ask a stranger to help us cross the road. The idea of a parent bailing us out if we broke the law was unheard of. They actually sided with the law!

Our parents didn't invent stupid names for their kids like 'Kiora' and 'Blade' and 'Ridge' and 'Vanilla'

We had freedom, failure, success and responsibility, and we learned HOW TO DEAL WITH IT ALL!

And YOU are one of them! CONGRATULATIONS!
