Old Biggin Hill'ite Derek White has passed us the sad news that another old friend, Ed Franklin, passed away just before Christmas. Ed and Derek were lifelong friends, having first met whilst doing their National Service in the RAF at Manby.

Ed, who would have been 81 in February, learned to fly with Alouette in the early 1960's, and was a weekend fixture thereafter, right through to at least the end of the 1970's. At the end of the `60s Ed started instructing with the South London Aero Club at Biggin Hill.

Ed apparently attended the Biggin Hill Reunited reunion party held in the Interflight hangar in September 2003, which was the last time that many of his airport friends saw him.

BRIAN AUSTIN

HI-VISIBILITY VESTS

AIR SHOW IN 2014?

Rumours abound about the return of air shows and Air Fair's currently. The airport has been investigating the possibility of arranging some form of "event" in 2014, but currently there are a number of issues and problems that need to be overcome before that could actually happen.

It is anticipated that these issues will be sorted out, and the airport hopes to be in a position to make a formal announcement in mid to late February. (Just don't expect it to be a reinstatement of the original Air Fair, but there is a genuine desire to have some form of event that the airport and the community would be proud of)

BIGGIN HILL AIRPORT MAJOR INCIDENT PRACTICE

Monday 20th January saw Biggin Hill Airport's Rescue & Firefighting Service joining with other local firefighting units, police, ambulance, and Red Cross personnel in a realistic simulation of a major aviation incident involving an aircraft with 35 passengers on board.

The night-time exercise was designed to test the effectiveness of the airport's Emergency Orders and the performance of all Emergency crews involved. Also under scrutiny was the overall incident coordination between the various agencies handling their respective tasks.

The simulation, staged in real time, began at 5pm when Air Traffic Control (ATC) initiated a Full Emergency for an inbound aircraft with 35 passengers on board. The pilot had advised difficulty in deploying the main landing gear. The ATC action instantly mobilised the airport Rescue & Firefighting team and all local emergency services. The landing incident took place at 5.17 close to runway 21, by which time all external services were on the airport and ready for action.

A group of 35 volunteers from within the London Borough of Bromley, many of who were students from Bromley College, provided the simulated passenger complement. They were seated in the cabin simulator to await rescue by the emergency teams.

Under the stark lighting of the five fire tenders on site, the firefighting team quickly quenched the flames using two foam tenders, following which rescue teams with breathing apparatus entered the cabin to assist and escort the passengers to a safe area before transferring them to the airport Terminal. Injured passengers would be taken direct to hospital.

A Survivor Reception Centre had been established at the Terminal by the Red Cross. Each survivor was interviewed as if for real to establish personal details, home contacts, onward journey and medical care if required. A Red Cross blanket was provided to all 'survivors'.

Following the exercise, all personnel engaged in the exercise attended a de-briefing session to discuss reaction and points for development. At the conclusion, Andy Mellers, Biggin Hill Airport's Senior Fire Officer, said that the night exercise had been a most valuable experience for his team from the Rescue & Firefighting Centre.

Thanks to Airport PR and Marketing Simon Ames for the detailed information on this very valuable exercise. As users, it is good to hear that so much emphasis is placed on safety services that we all hope we never need, but hope will be there for us should it ever be necessary. Well done to all the airport staff for their efforts....

MONTHLY REPORT FROM THE OFFICE OF WILL CURTIS

Firstly, a belated Happy New Year to you all!

January has been a reasonable month for Biggin Hill Airport with movements at a level just slightly above January 2013. Unlike many of our competitors, we have remained open for business as a result of our hard runway and hill top location. High winds have damaged some buildings but, as they say, man built it so man can repair it.

Our new SMS system is now being rolled out internally to staff and training will be complete by the mid of February. We hope, in the summer, to introduce a Biggin Hill iPhone/Android App to allow you to book out for VFR non flight-plan missions and also pick up notices and airport news. This App will also allow you to access the airport Safety Management System to make reports if required. You will also be able to use the App to report general problems requiring repair or to make suggestions for change.

We will be introducing a connection to our airport LAN by micro wave link to East Camp in the spring allowing us to add CCTV and to equip each gate with a security pass activated lock. These will be linked to the central airport security system so that security passes will be active on all authorised gates as soon as they are issued. I know that this has been a problem in East Camp in the past, so we hope this will improve matters. CCTV should help us all to sleep better at night knowing that our valuables are better watched and protected and, CCTV acts as a good deterrent against thieves and trespassers.

We hope to make physical improvements to East Camp in the not too distant future. Our East Camp plans are part of a wider airfield enhancement plan and subject to local authority permissions. With a fair wind, we hope to be able to make some measured improvements our airfield infrastructure over the coming 3 years. Once we have firm proposals we will share the plan with the Biggin Hill GA community to get your input, ideas and suggestions.

Hopefully we will make it through the winter without snow. I am sure this will be the case because in December we took the decision to hire additional snow clearing equipment for the winter months - always the best insurance against a heavy dump of snow! I personally can't wait for the warm spring weather to arrive.

Until next month I wish you safe and enjoyable flying.
