MARQUEE AT THE FESTIVAL OF FLIGHT

Following on from a previous Newsletter item, I am pleased to say that we have confirmed the availability of a User's and Tenants "Hurricane" Marquee for Sunday 20th August 2017 at the Festival of Flight. (The show this year promises to be a much bigger event, spread this time over the two days of 19th and 20th August)

As previously, the Marquee will be positioned right on the display line with a garden area from which to watch the show. There will be a pay bar offering very competetive prices (and the bar price list will be published well ahead of the show so we all know what is available and what prices etc.).

As before, the use of the marquee will be restricted to a maximum of 200 persons and once tickets are sold, no more will be available.

The price will be £25 per adult, £15 per child aged between 5 and 15, and £5 per child under 5. Additionally there will be the need to purchase show entry tickets.

Having said that, we have a special offer this year - a discount of £5 per above ticket where they are ordered and paid for prior to 30th June (ie. £20, £10, and free).

Tickets to the marquee will be exclusively available via myself, email <u>john@bigginhillreunited.co.uk</u> and postal address as shown on the form.

If you would like tickets reserved, please send your completed application form (attached to this email) back to me as soon as possible, together with your payment and a self-addressed and

stamped envelope to enable passes to be dispatched once available. Your order and payment will be acknowledged by email.

Remember passes will be reserved on a strictly first come, first served basis. Once the 200 allocation has been fully sold any further applications received will be returned.

VULCAN XH558 AND ADAMS AVIATION

At almost 65 years of age the Avro, or Hawker Siddeley, Vulcan is one of the most iconic British aircraft ever built. Its radical large delta-wing design was a world-beating success and led directly to both Concorde and the Space Shuttle. Although designed as a bomber its performance and agility was aligned more to that of a fighter and, in later years, always stole the show when appearing at Air Displays.

Sadly those days are gone and the last remaining flying example of this remarkable piece of engineering, marked XH558 and known as "The Spirit of Great Britain", which did its farewell tour in 2015, now requires care in its old age. Says Adams Aviation CEO, Stephen Gosling, "With the support of Concorde Battery Corporation, Adams Aviation is very happy to be involved in donating their batteries in order to keep this important aircraft powered.

In many ways even more importantly, in light of the fact that the aircraft will be losing its home in less than 3 months, and will then be spending time outside in all that the British weather offers, Adams Aviation has also given the Charitable Trust, who looks after its well-being, a quantity of ACF-50, the leading approved anti-corrosion solution for aircraft.

It's no easy feat to ensure the future of this aircraft, or any other important piece of our flying history, and we recognise there are many contentious issues surrounding XH558. Obviously there are differing opinions on how the current situation has been reached but, for us, the important thing is trying to make sure that this aircraft does not end up as merely a mention in the history books. With the changes being put upon future flying displays too, it seems even more important to try pulling together to help save our aviation heritage".

Anyone who has seen the Vulcan fly would surely not want to deny future generations of being able to hear its unmistakable "howl", even if just on the ground?

But the main focus for 2017 will be the Festival of Flight which has now been moved to the 19th & 20th August to allow us to return to the traditional format of a two-day show. Indications are that the display line up will be the strongest since the show returned in 2014, we should be able to release details very soon once the UK and overseas military confirm participation.

I know that John Willis is keen to start promoting the Hurricane Enclosure which will have its traditional frontline position in the hospitality area, we are planning to introduce a new garden bar facility with pre-published prices to take away the strain of carry your drinks in. With the ever increasing number of people working on the airport we expect tickets for the enclosure to be snapped up pretty quick.

MONTHLY REPORT FROM THE OFFICE OF WILL CURTIS

January has represented a few fine frosty days for flying although fewer than might be expected took advantage of this, perhaps due to the financial constraints imposed by Christmas. Meanwhile Business Aviation bounced back after a quiet December and revenues are up on

forecast, helped by our new de-icing machine which has been invaluable in getting our customers away on time on frosty mornings.

Work continues on the new terminal hangar with the site preparation phase now substantially complete. The IRVR system will hopefully be signed off for use shortly after a period of testing and verification over the autumn months. Once this is complete we will be able to offer touch down, mid-point and stop end RVR readings. Runway 29/11, now permanently closed, will shortly be remarked as a taxiway and signage and lighting updated. A plan to inform this work is currently under construction.

Recent foggy days have provided challenging conditions for aviators. Most light aircraft operators are sensible enough to understand the inherent danger in single engine IFR operations in zero/zero conditions. However, one operator who will remain nameless, elected to depart in a single engine aircraft in RVR conditions that grounded the business jet operators. At best this was grossly misplaced faith in the engineering of a single engine aircraft and at worst is was negligent, selfish and stupid. The airport will progress this matter with the CAA for further action and SANARB will decide what sanction to impose. For obvious reasons, I urge all aircraft operators, single, multi–engine, turbo prop or jet pilots to observe and operate only within the published aerodrome and EASA minima.

Hopefully February will provide some suitable days for flying. Until next month, safe flying!
