TERRY ROBINSON

It was with great sadness that I was advised recently of the passing of Terry Robinson a week or so ago at the age of 90. Many Biggin Hill'ites will know Terry from his regular attendance at meetings of the old Airport Users and Tenants Group as the representative from the Scout Aviation Centre at the airport until a couple of years or so ago. He was the Scout Centre's bookings secretary.

Apparently, Terry had had a fall at Christmas and developed double pneumonia, and finally Covid-19 (not clear if that was the cause of death but it certainly didn't help).

Given the lockdown, there can't be a 'normal' funeral but it is hoped there will be a memorial service post-lockdown when conditions allow.

As well as giving up many hours to help countless young people learn about aviation, Terry had been a pilot in the RAF during the Cold War and helped to maintain the UK air presence in the skies over Berlin flying a Chipmunk.

FEBRUARY BIGGIN HILL POSTED FUEL PRICES

The "posted" Biggin Hill Airport fuel prices, <u>excluding VAT</u>, for the calendar month of February 2020 are:

£1:46.5 per litre for 100LL Avgas if supplied from the Fuel Bowser (if uplifted <u>using account card</u> Only from the Self-Refuel pumps = minus 4p per litre)

£0:56.2 per litre for Jet A1

SPECIAL NOTE: Users should be aware that <u>credit and debit cards **cannot** currently be used at the self-refuel pumps.</u> The situation is likely to remain this way for some time, so if you use self-refuelling, please make sure you have your airport H-TEC fuel account card with you when you go there.

FORTHCOMING CHANGES TO VMC

For those of you who may not have seen this - The UK CAA have just announced that the UK is to revert to previous rules for Visibility and Distance from Cloud Minima for flying in visual meteorological conditions.

From 20 May 2021, the UK will revert to the rules on flight visibility and distance from cloud in class D airspace that existed up to 26 March 2020. The formal changes can be seen here:

But to summarise – here is an extract from the relevant section within that webpage:

QUOTE:

Through the Aviation Safety (Amendment) Regulations 2021, on 20 May 2021 the UK will implement an amendment to SERA.5001 Table S5-1 that modifies the VMC visibility and distance from cloud minima in airspace Classes D, F and G. <u>From 20 May 2021</u>, pilots will be deemed to have complied with the requirements of SERA.5001 when operating at or below 3,000 ft AMSL, or 1,000 ft above terrain, whichever is the higher, if they are flying:

Within Class D airspace:

- a) During day only;
- b) Indicated airspeed of 140 kts or less;
- c) Remains clear of cloud with the surface in sight and;
- (i) For aircraft other than helicopters, with a flight visibility of at least 5 km;
- (ii)For helicopters, with a flight visibility of at least 1,500 m.

Within Class F and G airspace:

- a) During day only;
- b) Indicated airspeed of 140 kts or less;
- c) For all aircraft, with a flight visibility of at least 1,500 m.

UNQUOTE

That has definitely helped me to pad out what would otherwise have been a very short Newsletter this month due predominantly to the lockdown preventing most GA activity..... [Ed]

MONTHLY NEWS FROM THE CEO's OFFICE

I seemed compelled to start another newsletter update that plunges straight into the challenges we all face as we endure another necessary national lockdown. The Airport continues to adapt its response to the current crisis; however, the strategy of prudent control of costs, active marketing and clear unambiguous internal and external communications, continue to be effective.

The detection of new variants of the virus and the significant increase in infections rates has presented new challenges for the Airport. We find ourselves, once again, enforcing 'Essential Travel' and adapting the operation to include additional measures enforced by continual changes in government advice and guidance.

The impact upon the wider Aviation Industry remains severe and the closing of several travel corridors and suspension of all non-essential international travel have compounded what was already a bleak situation. Whilst the vaccine presents 'light at the end of the tunnel', it is almost impossible to assess just how long such a tunnel is. The need to obtain a negative COVID test 72 hours before travelling and the discussions regarding the identification of specific quarantine hotels, adds further levels of complexity.

January has been an extremely challenging month for the Airport and will undoubtably result in a trading loss mirroring that of April last year. Movement levels were well below previous years and it is unlikely there will be a significant improvement before April. Whilst I would love to paint a more optimistic picture, the reality of the economic situation prevents me from doing so.

As I have stressed in all most every other update, developments at the Airport continue at pace and it is important the community know the confidence the Airport has regarding future inward investment.

The Bombardier hangar is progressing extremely well and remains on target for operational completion early next year. The CAA have now confirmed that the 03 GPS Approach has entered its final stage of the approval process. The Instrument Flight Procedure (IFP) design stage checks that the designed route matches the route consulted upon and meets the PAN OPS design requirements. It is hoped that the approach will be in operation sometime in May. Furthermore, the Airport has now commenced surface testing works on taxiway Foxtrot and plans to extend its

resurfacing programme to taxiways Alpha and Delta towards the later part of this year and I can confirm that the installation of the new 21 ILS has now been finalised for March 2021.

Some time ago, the Chairman decided to commission a book capturing both the history and the future of Biggin Hill Airport. The author, Alex Martin, is keen to start his research, via zoom, and would welcome any stories or anecdotes that he may wish to explore further. Anyone interested in supporting the project can drop me an email.

Finally, I hope you all stay safe and well.
