BAD STORMS AND GALES AT BIGGIN

The latter part of December again saw some massive storms and exceptionally strong winds battering the airport. It seems, in many ways, that these conditions were actually far worse than those experienced and commented on a few weeks before. These adverse conditions seem likely to continue as I write this.

Whilst there was extensive damage to property in the South East of the UK, Biggin Hill Airport itself seemed to get off quite lightly, and I haven't heard of any aircraft there suffering damage. Unlike Shoreham, where the river alongside overflowed its banks and flooded much of the airport, and Redhill aerodrome, just down the road, which suffered from extensive flooding, with TV News showing pictures of a Cessna 172 upside down on the peri-track, and semi-submerged light aircraft.

It seems Biggin Hill's owners are very meticulous about tying their aircraft down securely, and hangaring them whenever possible, and that obviously paid off..

Many people in the southern UK, and in particular parts of Kent, Surrey, and Sussex, were flooded badly and thousands were without power for many days. I hope none of our members suffered too badly and were at least able to enjoy their Christmas – a difficult time of year to be in that situation...

THE PASSING OF ANOTHER OLD FRIEND

Old Biggin Hill'ite, Derek Hardiman, sadly passed away on Saturday 21st December 2014. Derek, as many will remember, suffered a serious stroke some time ago, and had been being cared for in a home in recent months. Derek was an active member of several flying clubs, a regular visitor to the Pilots Pals Club Bar, and was involved with the voluntary organisation, Air Search, to which he willingly gave his time.

Derek spent the war as a train driver, a reserved occupation, and often recounted hairraising stories of driving trains during the Blitz. He remained with British Rail until his retirement, following which he visited his step-daughter, Mandy, and her family in Australia. It was here that he had his first flight in a light aircraft.

On returning to the UK, Derek learnt to fly at Biggin Hill. Besides aviation, Derek was also the proud owner of Jaguar cars, driving either his Jaguar XK8 Sports or Jaguar XJ Saloon to Jaguar Enthusiasts' Club events.

Biggin Hill'ite Peter Adams from Air Search wrote: "Derek joined Air Search some 4 years ago and flew with us once or twice a week until earlier this year. He loved to wear his uniform and interact with the Emergency Services. Derek formed many friendships, and was one of the great characters of Air Search and aviation and we will miss him very much."

His funeral will be held at Beckenham Crematorium, in Kent (BR3 4TD) on Friday 10th January 2014 at 2:15pm. Any friends and colleagues who wish to attend will be very welcome.

OPPOSITION TO BIGGIN HILL SECURITY CHANGES

It has been disappointing to see a video that has been circulating that is somewhat critical of the newly notified security arrangements that clearly, for some reason, don't suit some airport users.

(remember that Gatwick used to welcome us all in our light singles to come in for a cup of tea at virtually anytime day or night – and look at it now!) Times change!

Such criticism will actually achieve nothing at all, apart from possibly persuading the powers that be to not listen to the compromise ideas that were suggested to the management, and actually incorporated in the security plan in order to help minimise the effects of such changes on us all.

Before launching off into such childish acts, please just remember that it was the unfortunate actions of one single person at Biggin Hill Airport that subsequently resulted in virtually the whole airport tenancies having to pay massively increased business rates on their premises. What help was that?? Think carefully before you whinge and whine, it may not achieve what you hope for.

Holding a photo pass that allows you to open a security gate to get into the airport, and wearing a Hi Vis jacket when airside, really is not that onerous. Personally I feel that is a small price to pay for an airport that doesn't waterlog every time it rains, in the main remains open when there is snow fall, that offers full time customs and immigration, full runway lighting, and good airport hours, plus ILS etc..

If that is not what you want, please don't spoil things for those that are happy to have access to these facilities. There are, I'm sure, a number of smaller airports that would welcome your aircraft if you want to be able to operate with less restrictions, so you can always vote with your feet and move your aircraft elsewhere...

CRC CHECKS FOR THOSE WHO CHOOSE THAT ROUTE.

Following on from last month's item about obtaining a CRC check online, I would just like to mention that, after testing the system to see how difficult it was to get a check done, the actual certificate from Disclosure Scotland, following my application, arrived, as promised, well within 14 days. All in all, a very simple, and painless, process.

(Make sure you have a passport or drivers licence, plus a current utility bill handy, and also have your National Insurance number and place of birth to hand).
