#### DECEMBER WEATHER

What can I say about the December weather? In general, for our light aircraft, it has been pretty consistent – and mainly appalling!

As stated last month, whilst there have been a few quite pleasant and flyable days, most of the month has been absolute rubbish. Either very low cloud and poor visibility, plus much rain, and also very strong and gusty winds that were frequently at around ninety degrees to the one remaining Biggin Hill runway. Even when it has been possible to fly without being outside the aircraft crosswind limits, there were not many places one could fly to, as most nearby grass airports have been suffering from significant waterlogging, which of course restricted any circuit flying being carried out most of the time. Fortunately, Southend has been very user friendly and has permitted circuit training much of the time.

I will refrain from talking about us all looking forward to better conditions into January, as this certainly would probably jinx it.......

### LIGHT AIRCRAFT ACTIVITY IN DECEMBER

Largely as a result of the December weather, described above, there has been remarkably little GA flying activity this last month, which of course, is what one would expect given the conditions. Whilst we all expect poor weather at this time of the year, interspersed with some beautiful clear Winter flying days, albeit short due to the early Sunset time at this time of the year, this December weather has been one of the most consistently poor I can recall for very many years.

As we move into the New Year, I'm sure we are all hoping for better to come, so we can keep our flying current. Here's hoping.....

## NOISE ABATEMENT PROCEDURES AND NOISE SENSITIVE AREAS (NSA's)

It is good to realise that most Biggin Hill based aircraft take great pains to follow all the published Noise Abatement Procedures and to avoid all the Noise Sensitive Areas, in order to maintain a good relationship with residents in the immediate local area. (If you are not sure of the procedures required, contact Biggin Ops, who will be able to provide you with a detailed leaflet detailing all areas and routes to be flown.)

It is something that we all, as aircraft and airport operators alike, are very proud of. Such a shame that some visiting aircraft frequently ignore what they seem to treat rather as an inconvenience, and almost undo all the good work by Biggin based pilots...

Please keep up all that good work – it does not go unnoticed....

### AIRPORT DEVELOPMENT PROGRESS

Regular users and visitors at Biggin will undoubtedly have seen the massive progress on the two main developments at Biggin, namely the Bombardier huge new complex and also the new airport hotel construction.

As is mentioned in the monthly newsletter piece below from the Airport's CEO, David Winstanley, towards the end of this Newsletter, both these developments are progressing well and on schedule. The Bombardier complex is expected to be fully complete and ready for occupation around April, and the new airport hotel "The Landings" construction has now started with the main frame going up quite quickly. It is planned to be ready to be opened towards the end of 2022.

Additionally, the main entrance road from the roundabout all the way round to the Heritage Hangar, is to be resurfaced and having the addition of road lighting. This work is expected to commence at the beginning of 2022.

All extensive improvements that will help to secure the airport's long term future....

All we need now is the return of the Lookout Café where we, as users, and our local residents, can have somewhere to meet over coffee and lunch etc. Indications have been given that this is indeed likely to happen soon.

## JANUARY BIGGIN HILL POSTED FUEL PRICES

The "posted" Biggin Hill Airport fuel prices, excluding VAT, for the calendar month of January 2022 are:

£1:70.5 per litre for 100LL Avgas if supplied from the Fuel Bowser (if uplifted using <u>fuel account</u> card Only from the Self-Refuel pumps = minus 5p per litre)

£0:72.2 per litre for Jet A1 (or £1:13.5 per litre for "Sustainable Aviation Fuel"!)

<u>SPECIAL NOTES:</u> Users are advised that <u>credit and debit cards **can no longer** be used at the self-refuel pumps.</u> If you use self-refuelling, you will need your airport H-TEC fuel account card with you when you go there. (if you haven't got one with you, you will have to go over to the Main Terminal apron to uplift fuel from the bowsers instead).

## MONTHLY NEWS FROM THE CEO's OFFICE

As 2021 draws to close, I find myself reflecting on what has been another challenging year during which we have all had to face and overcome our own personal and professional hurdles. In many respects 2021 has been harder than 2020, given we have continually had the hope of emerging from this pandemic only to have hopes crushed by false dawns. Our reality is now a collective one where we acknowledge that COVID, in some form, is here to stay! As stated in last month's update, several European countries are initiating lockdowns and civil unrest as a result of vaccine policies and restrictions continues to spread. Against this backdrop, aviation has continued to struggle and Business Aviation was not immune during December.

Traffic levels throughout December have exceeded previous years and we will end the calendar year with the last five months of traffic movements comparable to 2019 pre-pandemic levels. That said, the speed of the spread of the Omicron variant and the variance of European government travel restrictions, means we are again faced with a huge degree of uncertainty regarding what the next four months might bring. There is room for some optimism, but this needs to be surrounded by the realism that the future remains unpredictable.

Development and investment in improved infrastructure proceeds at pace. The Airport remains on track to deliver the Bombardier Hangar development on time and on budget. The steel work for the hotel is progressing well and hopefully everyone can start to get a feel for what the hotel might look like. The new year will see the Airport start the works to upgrade Churchill way and progress a series of hangar development concepts within South Camp. The Airport continues to work with the CAA regarding the 03 RNAV approach approval and the progression of the Air Space Change for the 21 RNAV overlay.

The implementation of several recommendations from the Airport's 5-year review of the NAP continues at pace. The success trials of Webtrak have proved its accuracy beyond doubt, and this now means the Airport can focus on making continual improvements for the benefits of residents. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the community for its continued support in adhering to the NAP, and also further encourage the community to respect the noise sensitive areas around the Airport.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to wish everyone all the very best wishes for a Happy and Prosperous New Year.
