END OF AN ERA - ADAMS AVIATION MD RETIRES

Steve Langston, who joined Adams Aviation in 1972, and rose to become the Managing Director in 2000, retires at the end of June 2017 after getting on for five decades with the company.

Originally joining the fledgling team of two in Hammersmith for six weeks work experience, Steve never looked back. As a part of that initial team, headed by current Chairman, Frank Gosling, Steve helped the company grow considerably in those early years, and since being appointed to the position as MD in 2000, the company's turnover has continued to increase impressively from around £5m to some £24m in 2016.

"I'm honoured to publicly congratulate Steve for putting up with us all for so long!" quipped Stephen Gosling, Adams' CEO, adding "Really though I must thank him for the incredible amount he's taught me, on both a personal and professional level, and reassure him that we will all follow his lead with a determination to carry this company forward safely."

Our second event of the day was to host the Bromley Youth Music Trust band Big Phat Brass as they undertook their weekly rehearsals in the airport's terminal hanger. During the session the airport presented them with a cheque for £3,500 to enable BYMT to bring music to Biggin Hill Primary School and Charles Darwin school through their Band on the Run project.

MONTHLY REPORT FROM THE OFFICE OF WILL CURTIS

June has been another busy month for business aviation. As many will be only too well aware, this has placed a strain in light aviation and in particular upon circuit training at Biggin Hill. We recently met with Biggin Hill based flying clubs and schools to inform them that the availability of the circuit for training details will be limited and that they should make arrangements with neighbouring airfields for circuit training details in order to avoid undue delays or disappointment. As usual, whilst many have accepted this as the reality of the situation, some have chosen to push back and demand access to the circuit at Biggn Hill. This simply won't happen because we cannot physically accommodate it, so the choice is to do the required circuits elsewhere or alternatively, not to do them at all. Business aviation pays the bills at Biggin Hill, so with all due respect to light aviation and its undoubted importance to the UK aviation industry as whole, we must deal with whatever business aviation needs first and foremost.

In understanding why we have taken this approach, it may be useful to consider the facts. In May, circuits represented over 50% of all aircraft movements at Biggin Hill. Total airport revenues for the month were circa £1.5 million of which landing fees for circuits represented just £4,170 – or put another way just 0.3% of that income. Even if we take into account fuel and rents on premises, the total is less than 2% of revenues. Our business jet customers must, therefore, come first because they pay the bills - and nowadays, the bills are big!

It has become increasingly difficult to fit circuit training in amongst IFR arrivals and departures and our SMS (and our Board) tells us that we must make adjustments. We do not believe that this change will affect the quality of training delivered to students and it may well improve it since there will be far fewer interruptions to the student's progress at a quieter local aerodrome. Redhill has expressed enthusiasm for taking any circuit details that cannot be performed here at Biggin Hill, so schools and clubs will be able to take advantage of this. This is not a "circuit ban" as some have sought to suggest - it is what the Governor of the Bank of England calls "forward guidance" – i.e. forward notice that circuit details may be considerably more difficult to obtain in future as our business aviation side grows.

In other news, you will all see that the second parking hangar on the main apron is making good progress. We expect it to be housing aircraft by December this year and we have numerous enquiries for this space so we expect it to fully subscribed from day one. Our new hotel project has been the subject of a pre-application meeting with the borough planning division which went well and we expect to apply for full planning consent in the late summer with construction beginning late this year.

Since we adopted the new airport operating hours, we have seen a substantial increase in the volume of enquiries from business jet operators and aircraft maintenance firms. We hope to increase the built space at the airport in the coming years in order to produce more high value jobs and employment opportunities as well as rent and just as importantly, business rates and rents that will help the Council pay for services that might otherwise face cuts.

I am pleased to report that, with very few exceptions, light aircraft operators have followed the noise abatement procedures well and I would like to take the opportunity to that all concerned for their help in making improvements in this regard. The areas that seem most often breached are the southern tip of the zone covering Biggin Hill and Tatsfield and the extension of the downwind leg for runway 21 without good reason or justification. Obviously, we will take such instances up

with the pilots concerned, but I would be most grateful if you could take these points into account when arranging your flight. Thank you in advance for your cooperation.
