MAY WEATHER

Virtually the entire month of May has been CAVOK every day, but unfortunately very few people have been able to take advantage of it due to the Corona Virus restrictions on us all.

In the second half of the month, when the restrictions were slightly relaxed, a few airports started to re-open, and some solo light aircraft flying became possible.

Let's hope the light aviation restrictions do indeed become more relaxed during the month of June. If they are, let's hope that the weather continues to be as good as it has since the introduction of all the restrictions.

JUNE BIGGIN HILL POSTED FUEL PRICES

The "posted" Biggin Hill Airport fuel prices, excluding VAT, for the calendar month of June 2020 are:

£1.27 per litre for 100LL Avgas if supplied from the Fuel Bowser (if uplifted using account card or credit card from the Self-Refuel pumps = minus 4p per litre)

£0.43 per litre for Jet A1

CORONA VIRUS PANDEMIC

As most airport users will be aware, May has been subject to very obvious restrictions for all forms of light aircraft "recreational flying", which the CAA initially made clear was not permitted at all (except for some special limited solo 30 minute engine maintenance flights where required by the manufacturer). As a result of this restriction, most general aviation airfields also closed.

During the course of May, the DfT and the CAA relaxed slightly the recreational flying restriction making it possible for Light Aircraft to be flown again – but with only a single pilot on board (except that family members living in the same home are permitted to also be on board). Other than for commercial flight crew revalidations which are permitted, no training flying is currently permitted yet.

Other than flights permitted under the above rules, the airport's flying clubs remained closed to prevent breaching the Social Distancing requirements or the DfT and CAA guidance.

Biggin Hill Airport has remained open as a Port of Entry for commercial flying and essential flights carrying such items as PPE for the NHS and other care facilities.

Hopefully, assuming things continue to improve and continue to show a consistent downward trend on hospital attendances and deaths from the virus, we will almost certainly see a relaxation of the

current restrictions, but these relaxations are likely to remain relatively slow. It thought highly unlikely that things will suddenly revert completely to pre-virus normality.

"COBBY" INJURED

Biggin Hill's very own oldie, "Cobby", suffered a fall in his hangar about a week ago, injuring himself sufficiently that he was unable to get up un-assisted. Fortunately his predicament was discovered by one of Biggin Hill Airport's security staff, and Cobby was taken by ambulance to hospital.

Other than hearing he had injured his hip, we haven't heard how his recovery is going, but we would obviously wish him all the very best, and look forward to seeing him back at the airport soon...

PETER HORTON

It was with great sadness that we heard of the sad passing of another old Biggin Hill'ite, Peter Horton, on 1st May this year at age 75. He apparently contracted coronavirus, from which he didn't recover

Peter was a former British Airways Concorde pilot, with more than 9,000 hours on type. Additionally after leaving BA, he was a pilot with Goldair at Biggin Hill for some years.

A keen sailor too, he was well known for breaking many records in Concorde as a BA Captain, including celebrating the Millennium twice in one night, and taking the plane on a 'round the world' experience, including a non-stop flight from South America to New Zealand at twice the speed of sound. One of his closest personal memories included flying the Queen to Ottawa, Canada, on a state visit while he was commander of the royal flight.

A devoted family man, who lived in St Olave's, he is survived by his wife, Judith, his daughter, Carrie, and his son Paul and their families who all live in America.

Peter was well respected by all who knew him, and will be missed by his many aviation and sailing friends.

His name has been added to the Biggin Hill Reunited Roll of Honour. R.I.P. Peter

Lt Cdr PETER SHEPPARD AFC RN

We received notice of the sad passing of Lt Cdr Peter Sheppard AFC RN, who died on 6th February. Known to many at Biggin Hill, for his amazing Royal Navy Fleet Air Arm displays at the Biggin Hill Air Fair's over many years.

Peter was a Korean War Sea Fury pilot who would later go on to fly the Sea Vixen amongst many other types. He is probably most well known for being one of the founding members of the Royal Navy Historic Flight and many will remember his legendary Sea Fury displays.

His funeral was held on 27th February at Barnstable Crematorium

A great character, he will be missed by many, particularly by those who remember him on the air display circuit. R.I.P. Peter

MONTHLY NEWS FROM THE CEO's OFFICE

A further month into the COVID-19 crisis and the optimists will point to the reducing infection rate and lifting of lockdown measures and the pessimists will point to no vaccine and concerns about a second wave of infections. Wherever you sit on this spectrum, it is highly unlikely you haven't been adversely affected by this terrible and sad crisis.

As I stated in my update last month, London Biggin Hill airport remains open as part of the national transport infrastructure in line with government guidelines. Operationally, the number of flights have remained low throughout May, with a slight increase as the restrictions of GA recreational flying have been relaxed. That said, with traffic levels at 40% of what we would normally be experiencing, the Airport has been trading at a loss.

With the easing of some of the restrictions on GA recreational flying, I am aware many of you have returned to the skies albeit in a limited fashion. I am also aware that this return has raised concerns about the increase in landing fees published on our website in March. Whilst the Airport has always published price increases via our website, I have already apologised to some members of the Light Aviation Steering Group for not raising this at our last meeting in April. However, given that our March meeting was postponed and we were dealing with the COVID-19 crisis, I am sure everyone can appreciate we had other more pressing issues to deal with.

The Airport continues to engage with central government, DfT and the CAA regarding quarantine restrictions, which will have a severe impact on the Airport's ability to recover to anything like normal operations in June. The uncertainty around quarantine and its exceptions is less than helpful at a time when businesses were hoping to see some 'shoots of recovery'.

I would like to end by wishing all the very best in these trying times and hope that you remain safe and well.
