Sadly we received notification from long term Biggin Hill'ite, Dave Parry, earlier this month that a friend, neighbour, and another old Biggin Hill'ite, Michael Clegg, passed away in April. Many of us older airport folks will almost certainly remember him from those early days. We understand that Mike became quite ill in the latter part of 2021, and he was moved into a home where he could be properly looked after.

Mike was a very active flyer at Biggin Hill for many years. Dave explained that he used to fly with him quite a lot in the 1990's, going regularly to France and the Channel islands from time to time. *[I personally remember him many years back when he flew at Air Touring. Ed]* He retired from flying at age 70.

From a work point of view, Mike worked for Seismograph in Keston for some 20 years or so. Additionally, his other interest was his Aston Martin Lagonda car, which he owned for many years. He was very knowledgeable about motor engineering, and he also apparently had a lot of knowledge about electrical systems.

Mike, who lived in Biggin Hill valley, left a wife, and four sons, as well as many Grand-children. His funeral was held at the BlueBell Cemetery in Knockholt on the 19th May.

AIRPORT DEVELOPMENT PROGRESS

Our airport improvements have continued at quite a pace...

The new "Landings Hotel" by the entrance to the South Camp is progressing well and definitely looks like the target opening in December is likely to be right... Another long needed development that has finally moved towards completion after many years of discussion.

We are still awaiting the construction of the new security office on the site of the original Old Armoury building opposite the main industrial estate, and next to the current Bombardier hanger. We can expect some signs of building soon I believe.

The main interior roadway, Churchill Way, is now complete from the entrance right round to the Heritage Hangar – very impressive. The anticipated new external street lighting along by the new pavements appears to be almost ready for installation to be ready by the time the shorter days return later in the year. ...

The new huge Bombardier Hangar and complex is now looking complete, and signage has recently been added... We can expect Bombardier start to transition fairly soon from the existing hangar by the South Camp entrance, to the new complex...

JUNE BIGGIN HILL POSTED FUEL PRICES

The "posted" Biggin Hill Airport fuel prices, *excluding VAT*, for the calendar month of June 2022 are:

 \pounds 2:29.5 per litre for 100LL Avgas if supplied from the Fuel Bowser (if uplifted using <u>fuel account card</u> <u>Only</u> from the Self-Refuel pumps = minus 5p per litre)

£1:12.4 per litre for Jet A1 (or £1:29.9 per litre for "Sustainable Aviation Fuel"!)

SPECIAL NOTES: Users are advised that <u>credit and debit cards</u> **can no longer** be used at the selfrefuel pumps. If you use self-refuelling, you will need your airport H-TEC fuel account card with you when you go there. (if you haven't got one with you, you will have to go over to the Main Terminal apron to uplift fuel from the bowsers instead).

MONTHLY NEWS FROM THE CEO's OFFICE

Despite the continued pressure we all face as a result of the current increases in the cost of living and the resultant inflation, business aviation continues to buck the trend across the industry in terms of a sustainable recovery. For those of you who will have flown from the Airport over the most recent weekend, you will have seen first-hand how busy the Airport was.

That said, any suggestion that the continued growth in traffic levels provides an indication that the sector is unaffected by the current economic challenges, would be an over-simplification. The continued increase in commodity prices will undoubtedly result in increases in the cost of Jet A1 and Avgas. Added to these challenges, the aviation industry and other industries are seeing real challenges in the labour market, so despite the continued overall recovery, calmer waters are still some way off.

Importantly, the Airport continues to reinvest to improve infrastructure and continue to attract inward investment. Work continues to support Bombardier's operational transfer from Hangar 510 to their new facility, Hangar 401. The hotel construction continues at pace and the airport is delighted to announce it is now actively recruiting for hotel managerial positions. The Airport continues to engage with Pentridge, English Heritage and the London Borough of Bromley regarding the potential redevelopment of elements of West Camp. The enhancements to Churchill way are almost complete and work continues to finalize the design of the new entrance and gate house. The re development of hangar 710 is progressing in line with the construction programme and discussions continue regarding future hangar expansion across the site.

The Airport continues to invest in several suitability initiatives and has now completed the transfer of energy suppliers to secure a green tariff making a carbon saving of 55% and 303.8 tonnes of carbon dioxide annually at our current rate of consumption. Hydrotreated Vegetable Oil (HVO) fuel has now replaced the red diesel for use in all vehicles cable of operating on HVO. This follows the changes in legislation that governs the use of red diesel. Following the completion of the mapping of the Airport's carbon use, the results have now been verified as required by the Airports Carbon Accreditation (ACA) scheme, by an independent environment company, GEP Environmental, based in Winchester. This has now been passed to ACA, with an expected confirmation that Level 1 has been achieved in June

Finally, the Airport would like to thank the Airport Community for its continued support of the Noise Abatement Procedures and for helping the Airport to fulfil its commitments as a good neighbour.
