MARCH BIGGIN HILL POSTED FUEL PRICES

The "posted" Biggin Hill Airport fuel prices, excluding VAT, for the calendar month of March 2020 are:

£1.490 per litre for 100LL Avgas if supplied from the Fuel Bowser (if uplifted using account card or credit card from the Self-Refuel pumps = minus 4p per litre)

£0.590 per litre for Jet A1

NEW MAJOR AIRPORT DEVELOPMENT

As many will have seen, the new very large Hangar and other facilities for Bombardier has now commence construction. Situated to the South of the self-fuel facility in the centre of the airport and across the old runway 29, this huge complex will be the main European Bombardier support centre.

Much of the eastern side of the runway 11/29 from Lima 1 has now been dug up in preparation for the build.

Such a development is a clear feather in the cap for Biggin Hill Airport, and should help to secure the long term future of the airport for GA, both light and corporate, and the management should be congratulated for this contract that I suspect was secured against significant competition from other UK and European airports.

THINKING OF BECOMING AN AIRCRAFT OWNER?

If you are thinking of becoming an aircraft owner, I have a Biggin Hill based 1967 Piper PA28-180C that I am considering selling outright, or possibly looking to find a couple of additional people who want to become a part-owner of an aircraft.

The aircraft is excellently equipped with an Aspen Glass cockpit, Garmin 430 (8.33 KHz) Nav/Com, a second 25 KHz King Nav/Com, a Mode S Transponder with ADSB. An Autopilot with nav coupling and Roll Steering to automatically follow your pre-programmed nav routing. It has an electronic fuel flow meter with built in EGT.

The 4 seat aircraft has only 8,700 airframe hours total since new, and the engine has total 1,330 hours since overhaul (TBO is 2,000 with a potential 10% additional extension, but on condition operation thereafter for private non-commercial use). It has winglet wing tips with two hi-intensity wing tip landing lights and a single hi-intensity LED nose taxy light. It has a brand new Annual Check just completed, and the flap spar mods carried out during the annual.

MONTHLY NEWS FROM THE CEO's OFFICE

Well, by the time you read this update I will have been in post almost a year to the day and what a year it has been. I would like to take this opportunity to thank you all for your support over the past 12 months.

Whilst January seemed to pass us by with relatively little adverse weather, February has roared in with storms, torrents of rain and even snow. This sharpens our focus to ensure the Airport community as a whole look at robust winter operations and the continuing drive to ensure we maintain a 'clean wing' policy at Biggin Hill. This again increases the importance of our investments in the 03 GPS approach, the 21 overlay and the replacement ILS. With regard to the ILS, I am pleased to report that the Board has approved its replacement which will be targeted for full operational use by the Autumn of this year.

The Airport continues to perform well against the back drop of a declining UK/London market, where we continue to hold our own! The uncertainty regarding the final negotiated deal with our European partners does not seem to have had a material impact on the Airport, although it is still early days. The building pressure in terms of the environmental impact of Business Aviation is clearly prominent and the Airport is actively looking at the development of a robust sustainability policy as part of our CSR programme.

At last, this month saw the formal announcement of the Bombardier Hangar development, which is great news for not only the Airport but for the economic benefits it will bring to the region as a whole. Many of you will have already noticed the start of the civil works for the hangar and, together with the Hotel and College, later this same year, this is an exciting time for the Airport.
