#### **FEBRUARY WEATHER**

This month, remaining in the lockdown, and with Leisure Flying prevented under law, again the weather has again been somewhat irrelevant, as we have all been unable to fly. One day we might actually be able to fly again!

### **UK COVID LOCKDOWN**

As with last month, Covid restrictions are still preventing flying for leisure or PPL /LAPL training yet again. There have been many posts on Social Media that suggest all will be back to normal on certain dates in March, but these dates are refuted by the CAA and more importantly, the Department for Transport, who are the Government Department that has the responsibility of advising us all when these restrictions will be relaxed. At the time of writing this Newsletter, the DfT have not published any changes to the rules that would permit us to fly!

Clearly, as the lockdown does seem to have reduced the number of cases, deaths, and people in Hospitals quite substantially, we all expect the situation to improve in the not too distant future – BUT currently nothing has yet been formally published so we must ensure we don't jump the gun!

We are still in Lockdown and prevented from doing training and leisure flying – please be patient, it will eventually come, but it's not there yet!

### MARCH BIGGIN HILL POSTED FUEL PRICES

The "posted" Biggin Hill Airport fuel prices, <u>excluding VAT</u>, for the calendar month of March 2021 <u>has yet to be published</u>. Just for interest, a reminder of February's rates are:

£1:46.5 per litre for 100LL Avgas if supplied from the Fuel Bowser (if uplifted <u>using account card</u>
Only from the Self-Refuel pumps = minus 4p per litre)

£0:56.2 per litre for Jet A1

<u>SPECIAL NOTE:</u> Users should be aware that <u>credit and debit cards still **cannot** currently be used at the self-refuel pumps.</u> The situation is likely to remain this way for some time, so if you use self-refuelling, please make sure you have your airport H-TEC fuel account card with you when you go there.

If an updated set of fuel prices are subsequently released by the airport, I will post them on the BigginHillReunited Group's Facebook page.

## **BACK TO FLYING EVENTUALLY – THINGS TO REMEMBER**

In view of the lockdown, many of us will probably be very rusty and possibly may even have invalid licences! As there is so little for me to write about in this month's newsletter because of the lack of GA flying still, I felt it might be a good idea to use the space to remind us all of what we should look out for.....

<u>Flying while Lockdown is still in place.</u> In spite of what some people will suggest, no "leisure" flying or training for such flying is permitted, but with just a couple of exceptions:

If you own an aircraft, which has not of course been able to fly under lockdown, but which still has a valid Certificate of Release, then it MAY be permitted to carry out an engine maintenance flight periodically in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations – typically this will be an "A to A" flight of either 30 or 60 minutes once every one or two months. But, on such flights you must NOT have passengers on board!!!

If you are training for a professional licence, then this training may continue, including hour building or ratings required before commencing the formal CPL course itself. This is NOT just that you have a vague idea that one day you might think of doing one, but being able to prove that you are already working towards it, for example that you have already passed all or at least most of the required CPL/ATPL written exams!

<u>Flying once the lockdown restrictions are formally lifted</u> (Although, as we said above, no formal dates have yet been announced, in spite of many people suggesting it's going to be OK from certain dates!) so we are unable to fly again yet for leisure purposes. So before we do get into the air again:

It is imperative that you check that your Pilots Licence and Medical are still current and valid. For example:

Is the licence still valid (older licences had an expiry date whereas newer ones are for life)?

Is your SEP or other expiring ratings still shown as still valid on your licence?

Does your medical Certificate still have calendar time left until it expires.

And remember, you cannot carry any passengers unless you have provably

And remember, you cannot carry any passengers unless you have provably completed 3 take offs and landings within the preceding 90 calendar days!

## Things to remember when flying restarts at Biggin:

Noise sensitive areas: Make sure you are fully familiar with the noise sensitive areas adjacent to the airport that should be avoided. There is a pamphlet available from the airport that illustrates these, and some computer devices also show these on the moving map applications like SkyDemon. Principally, these include: Biggin Hill village and Tatsfield and Downe Villages, and Keston and Orpington built up areas, plus the housing along the main road alongside the airport. Please try to be a good neighbour to avoid any issues for the airport itself.

Noise abatement procedures: It is important also to follow the noise abatement procedures at Biggin. These are not too onerous – just a 10 degree "track" change to the right on crossing the main road on runway 21 departures, or a right turn at one mile towards Sevenoaks on departure from runway 03. And of course on 21 departures don't turn left too early so as to avoid overflying Tatsfield.

You are reminded that operating or promoting cost sharing flights on such platforms as Wingly or similar, are totally banned at Biggin Hill. (if you believe you can, then I'd advise you to look at the A.I.P. textual information section – 2.20 Local Aerodrome Regulations – item 1 (h))

As I would hope many of you would find out when reading the NOTAM's before flying - Farnborough Lower Airspace Radar Service (LARS) is currently out of service.

### MONTHLY NEWS FROM THE CEO's OFFICE

As I write this latest update for the newsletter, the Airport is picking through the governments roadmap to easing lockdown restrictions and trying to see when we might get clear guidance regarding General and Business Aviation. Through RABA and the AOA, the Airport is endeavouring to ensure we can influence the governments new global travel task force, which is due to report directly to the PM by 12<sup>th</sup> April. We hope that we might see significant easing of existing travel and flying restrictions by 17<sup>th</sup> May. In the meantime, we will continue to enforce only legally permitted essential flying.

The impact upon the wider Aviation Industry was eased to a limited extent by the launch of the governments Airport Ground Operations Support Scheme; however, this excluded all airports with less than 12 scheduled aircraft movements. This resulted in the vast majority of smaller airports, including Biggin Hill, from being excluded from the scheme. It is impossible to fathom why medium size airports that have the backing of significant foreign investors should benefit at the exclusion of smaller airports across the UK.

Trading throughout February has been as challenging as January and this continues to present significant challenges for a business like ours with high fixed costs. Traffic levels remain almost 50% down on what we would expect in a normal February and we acknowledge that many of our partners across the Airport will be faced with similar challenges.

Thankfully, developments at the Airport continue at pace, and the whole community will see significant work being undertaken throughout March, April and May to ensure the Airport is ready for the expected increase in movements from June onwards. The Bombardier Hangar developments continues to be ahead of programme, and we will shortly start work on extending the apron abeam hangar 446 to support out Jota operation. Additionally, we will be accelerating our resurfacing programme, and work will commence on both taxiways Foxtrot and Delta within the next 2 months. In the next week or so we will start to replace our existing ILS, which should be completed within the month of March. Lastly, it would appear the Airport is close to completing the final stage of the 03 GPS air space change process, and we are targeting an in-operation date of 17<sup>th</sup> June.

Last month I informed the community that the Chairman had decided to commission a book capturing both the history and the future of Biggin Hill Airport. The author, Alex Martin, is keen to start his research, via zoom, and will soon be contacting individuals to discuss their stories about Biggin Hill. Anyone interested in supporting the project can drop me an email.

Finally, I hope you all stay safe and well.
