APRIL WEATHER

This last month has seen lots of changeable conditions, particularly affecting light aircraft at Biggin. We have experienced periods of the classic "April showers" on occasions, but also periods of several days of extremely poor visibility with anticipated improvements in the forecast that simply didn't happen until so late in the day as to be too late for most people to take advantage of.

And yet, we also had some periods of record temperatures for the time of year, with the Easter Bank Holiday weekend proving to be excellent for family functions even if the visibility was not the best for us flyers.

So all in all, a very changeable month with some highs, and some lows... Summer is surely on its way.

THE NEW FEES AT BIGGIN FOR LIGHT AIRCRAFT

As we move towards May, the new, much higher, landing fees introduced on 1st April showed signs of biting.

There were periods during April when, with very few jet movements at certain times, Biggin Hill somewhat resembled a ghost town, with virtually no aircraft around anywhere. Certainly something I have never experienced at Biggin before in my almost 60 years at the airport. That's not to say that it is always quiet, of course, but certainly very noticeable at times.

The new rates have certainly had an impact on flying at Biggin (which some would say was what the airport wanted, although I'm not sure they wanted it that quiet!). As an owner, even though the new prices will not currently persuade me personally to sell the aircraft, or move it elsewhere, it certainly has an effect. The odd, spur of the moment, "oh, sod it – lets go flying" has become, "oh, do I really want to spend getting on for 50 quid for the landing fee, just to go for a 20 or 30 minute flutter around the local area" – and I have to say, in the main, I haven't bothered!

From private pilots, and flying club members point of view, I think it has been instrumental in getting people to re-assess whether Biggin Hill is actually worth flying from at all, when it is so much cheaper elsewhere.

We have always said that learning to fly at Biggin Hill is excellent, as it gets new pilots used to flying within a busy commercial environment from day one, and is one of the reasons (in my opinion) that nowadays very few problems are experienced at the airport with "Biggin

based, or Biggin trained" pilots – although we are all aware the same cannot always be said for visiting, "non-based" pilots when they come to Biggin.

My fear is that, in the South East corner of the UK, this reduction in Biggin trained general aviation pilots will result in even more problems for the airport into the future with people skirting around the edge of Biggin, or when visiting the airport.

Time will tell.

NEW CHIEF EXECUTIVE AT BIGGIN

Biggin Hill Airport's new CEO, David Winstanley, has certainly been very active in meeting people and canvassing views and opinions from many people around the airport in his first full month in the job.

Clearly he is not going to be able to change everything to take all our views into account, but it is good that he is actively seeking dialogue with all interested parties. He has positively said at several meetings that light aircraft are assured a continued future at Biggin Hill, which is encouraging of course. But that future is unfortunately at a cost that many will simply not be able to justify and may seek to relocate to more GA user friendly and cost effective airports.

So, having been thrown into the deep end at an airport so different from the one he came from (Birmingham International), he has certainly made himself available to interested parties to sound out views. Reports from those that have been able to sit down with him, are, in the main, very positive.

AIR SHOW OWNERS, USERS & TENANTS MARQUEE

Unfortunately, as we speak, in spite of requests, the air show organiser has said there are no plans to provide a special Marquee and viewing area for airport users and tenants, preferring the more expensive (£55 a head) catered public marquee with bar, and shared with non-airport people that they had last year.

Clearly, from the comments I received last year, where we struggled to even reach the maximum 100 place allocation given to us, instead of the getting on for 200 we normally had for the basic marquee (£18 to £20 a head, excluding show entry tickets) in the previous years, this facility simply is not what we all wanted. As a result, I am not planning any involvement in the show this year.

MONTHLY NEWS FROM THE CEO'S OFFICE

Fifty plus days in post and I am slowly getting my feet under the table and learning quickly regarding different aspects of Business and General aviation. The warm welcome I received in my first few days has continued and I am very grateful for the patience shown by the London Biggin Hill Airport community in bringing me up to speed. That said, I am acutely aware that 'talk is cheap' and I need to demonstrate I am listening and balancing the needs of all users of the Airport.

Turning to development news, I am pleased to report that the resurfacing works on Charlie taxiway are now due to commence early May. These works are essential enabling works that will precede the resurfacing of Hotel taxiway, which is due to commence by mid-May. The Hotel taxiway works should take approximately 22 weeks and Temporary Operating Instructions will be issued shortly. Work continues to deliver the GPS approach for Rwy 03 and most of the community will notice the works to fit the new approach lights.

Wider afield, I am pleased to report that both the Hotel and Aerospace College remain on track with planning approvals proceeding as planned. Hopefully, the community will see the start of these developments towards the end of the year.

I had hoped to visit with more of the community than I have done to date; however, I am currently spending time 'back to the floor' with teams across the Airport company ensuring I understand as much as I can about London Biggin Hill.
