ROBIN STOKES

Sadly, 15th March 2021 saw the passing in hospital of old Biggin Hill'ite, Robin Stokes at age 62 after a short illness.

Born in 1958 in Malta, after leaving school, the family moved to Tatsfield, which gave Robin the opportunity of following in his father, Philip Stokes (who flew with Decca, and Euroair at Biggin), passion for all things aviation. Robin worked as an aeronautical engineer at Biggin Hill (companies including Avtech), Aberdeen, and Southend, before moving to Hants and Sussex Aviation at Blindley Heath.

Robin suffered from a leaky heart valve for a decade, but he had a heart murmur for life. He went into hospital early February 2021 after suffering a heart attack and double pneumonia. While at Southend Hospital he couldn't have visitors due to covid. He was moved to Basildon Hospital heart clinic in his last week to try and repair his heart. On his last day he was placed in a coma but unfortunately died on the 15 march 2021, just 2 hours into his coma.

In his last week he caught covid so that was listed on the death certificate as a contributing factor even though he didn't have symptoms

He is survived by his family, Wife Susan, Daughter Alison Rogers nee Stokes, and son Son Richard, plus Grandchildren.... Robin's family funeral was held at Southend Crematorium on the 12th April.

Robin's name has been added to the Biggin Hill Reunited Roll of Honour. R.I.P. Robin

GORDON OHLSON

I was told this month of the sad passing of old Biggin Hill'ite, Gordon Ohlson. Gordon died in early April after a period of ill health. Gordon will be known to many old Biggin Hill'ites as the Chief Engineer at Decca and then Racal for many years.

He trained as an engineer in the RAF, where he spent around 5 years, working on Meteors and Vampires in those early days. He then got a job as an engineer for Decca at Croydon initially, before they moved to Biggin Hill in the early 60's. His boss then was a senior engineer known as Mr Campbell, who we believe may have been ex-British Airways (or whatever it was called in those days).

Decca operated their Percival Prince aircraft from the western side of what was then Air Couriers Hangar near where the self-refuelling is currently. Gordon subsequently became the Chief Engineer in around 1967, working with Captain Bill Poulter who flew the Prince. In around 1974, they also operated an early Jetstream aircraft, which eventually replaced the Prince.

In about 1980 Decca moved its operations across the airport to the Blue RTZ hangar on the South side. Gordon famously rebuilt the Jetstream about twice I'm told. Eventually the Prince went and the company, now taken over by Racal, also operated an HS125.

Gordon remained with the company until it eventually closed in about 1988, at which time he moved to Bournemouth as the Chief Engineer for a local airline there until his retirement.

Gordon's family funeral was held on 23rd April in Poole, Dorset.

He is survived by his wife, Katie, and his two daughters, Dawn and Lesley.

A really lovely man, and a tremendous engineer, he will be missed by many old Biggin Hill'ites of that era.

Gordon's name has been added to the Biggin Hill Reunited Roll of Honour. R.I.P. Gordon

UK ROADMAP - HOW IS IT GOING?

As discussed last month, the UK Government's "Roadmap out of Lockdown" is now well and truly underway.

So where exactly are we now?

<u>STEP 1</u> This Step commenced on 29th March and allowed licenced pilots who are in recency to fly solo.

<u>STEP 2</u> This Step commenced on 12th April, and allowed flight training or flights with an instructor to recommence. So at this point flying clubs and schools recommenced operations...

<u>STEP 3</u> This Step, is hoped to commence no earlier than 17th May, and should principally allow some larger sporting events and similar, to commence subject to suitable social distancing etc.

Meeting others outdoors will hopefully be permitted, but not with groups of 30 or more which will remain illegal. The suggestion is that indoor meetings socially of up to 6 persons or 1 other household MAY be permitted.

<u>STEP 4</u> This final Step should, hopefully, commence no earlier than 21st June, and is when the Government hopes to remove all legal limits on social contact, and reopen any remaining closed settings.

Normality seems as if it is actually on the way!!!!

MAY BIGGIN HILL POSTED FUEL PRICES

The "posted" Biggin Hill Airport fuel prices, <u>excluding VAT</u>, for the calendar month of May 2021 are:

£1:58 per litre for 100LL Avgas if supplied from the Fuel Bowser (if uplifted <u>using account card</u> <u>Only</u> from the Self-Refuel pumps = minus 4p per litre)

£0:59.8 per litre for Jet A1

SPECIAL NOTES: Users should be aware that <u>credit and debit cards **cannot** currently be used</u> <u>at the self-refuel pumps.</u> The situation is likely to remain this way for some time, so if you use self-refuelling, please make sure you have your airport H-TEC fuel account card with you when you go there.

MONTHLY NEWS FROM THE CEO's OFFICE

The focus for the Airport throughout April has centred on operational readiness for a return to increased traffic levels post 17th May. Although there remains some uncertainty regarding the specific details surrounding what countries will be in what traffic light classification as part of the Global Travel Task force recommendations, there is clearly significant latent demand in the sector. That said, there is still no room for complacency and the Airport continues to take a cautiously optimistic view regarding the next few months.

Although April remained a challenging month, we have seen the early signs of recovery. Movements levels were not dissimilar to pre COVID levels for this time of year although the European and Transatlantic markets remain slow to recover. That said, the internal US market, Asia and the Middle East appear to be recovering well.

Turning to development across the site, I am delighted to announce that the Bombardier hangar will be competed ahead of schedule and will be complete in December this year. This is an impressive achievement given the scale of the development and the challenges presented by COVID-19.

Maintaining this positive theme, I am pleased to report the new ILS went into operation on the 1st April and exploratory works have commenced on taxiway Foxtrot. Work will also commence soon extending apron in front of hanger 446 and resurfacing taxiway Delta; these works are planned to be completed by July this year. Unfortunately, progress regarding the implementation of the 03 RNAV approach remains slow and we continue to work with the CAA in getting the IFP design approved.

April has seen a welcome return to the skies for some of our GA community and I would like to take this opportunity to once again stress the importance of addressing any potential skills fade that might have occurred during the lockdown. I hope everyone has seen the Airport notice emphasises aspects of the CAA Safety Notice SN-2021/008 covering aspects for the safe return to normal operations. It is also a timely opportunity to remind everyone of our noise abatement procedures and the importance of avoiding all Noise Sensitive Areas

I notice that many of our home-based GA community have signed up to our Home-Based Aircraft discount scheme. I trust the community considers the scheme is working well; however, do drop me a line if that is not the case.

Finally, I hope you all stay safe and well.
