OCTOBER WEATHER

What a strange month! Whilst it has been quite pleasant on occasions, particularly in the latter part of the day, we have been plagued with periods of either poor visibility, low'ish cloud bases, or winds from unusual directions that exceeded crosswind limits (especially for students), and where the currently closed runway 11/29 being available could possibly have helped save some more days for flying.

On the subject of the crosswind runway, Will Curtis has confirmed that they are still receiving and including consultation responses, even though the formal period has closed. As I mentioned before, if you haven't yet responded, please do so – but do make your responses polite and offer practical suggestions that may help to make your point for the requirement for availability of a crosswind facility at the airport if that is indeed what you want. BIGGIN HILL AIRPORT'S SAFETY MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

Many of you have asked me about the airport's Safety Management System and how and when should it be used.

The airport does have a very professional SMS that is available to all airport users to alert the airport management to issues or situations that may be considered a matter of safety concern, or relate to Quality of Service, or Noise issues which could affect the airport's relationship with our neighbours.

Of course, it is important that the system is used properly and entries are only made where it is believed that either airport and flight safety could be improved, quality of service received requires compliment or criticism, or actions reported that could impact on or cause noise complaints. Inputs are seen, not only by the Airport's Management and the Safety

Management Team, but specifically in the case of Safety matters, potentially by the Civil Aviation Authority, so it is important that it is not used frivolously or for inappropriate matters.

The clubs at the airport (EFG, Surrey and Kent, and Alouette) have all been set up so that the system can be used for their staff and members. Other operators and private owners can have themselves added to the system as a registered user. REPORT FROM THE OFFICE OF THE COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT MANAGER

Biggin Hill Airport has collaborated with the charity "Fly2Help" to stage the first Aim High Scholarship during the half term break. You may know Fly2Help from the Air Smiles days that are organised by their local volunteer Mike Rivett. I know that quite a few on the airport have helped bring a smile to families that are currently going through hard times.

The Aim High project brings ten young people aged between 15 and 18 years to the airport to discover the career opportunities in aviation, starting with an application that showed their interest in aviation, the final sixteen were whittled down to ten after attending an interview.

Keeping ten scholars hungry for information occupied for five days was no mean feat and the lead volunteer from Fly2Help, Glen Stanley, organised a full on week both here at Biggin Hill and with visits to London City and Gatwick. Every company that we approached on the airport immediately engaged with the project and a big thank you goes out to Signature, Castle Air, Jets, RAS, The Heritage Hangar, Biggin ATC, Airport Fire Service, Biggin HR, RAF recruitment, the refuelling team, EFG and the Lookout Café, if I have missed anyone I apologise.

The week culminated in the scholar's parents and teachers attending and hearing from them and hearing a presentation from them about what they had achieved during the week and witnessing the obligatory certificate presentation from Will Curtis. We have already committed to Aim High 2017, so if you know a young person who is looking to make a career in aviation we will be advertising from late May.

Foal Farm, the charitable animal rescue centre at Biggin Hill, has benefited from a donation of £1257 this week raised by supportive staff at Biggin Hill Airport. Myself and my dog Bonnie was joined by Siobhan Curtis, wife of airport MD Will Curtis and her dog Gladstone to present the cheque to Debra Taylor, Manager of Foal Farm. In offering her thanks to the airport staff for their generosity, she said that it was wonderful that they had chosen Foal Farm as one of their charities. "The amount of regular income generated by Foal Farm supporters enables us to help all the animals that come through our gates. Your kind support has been a part of helping this to happen" said Debra. "With our menage of horses, donkeys, cows, pigs, sheep, goats, chickens, ducks and geese, we have a big cost commitment to cover. While all of these will now spend the rest of their natural lives at the farm, our rescued dogs, cats, rabbits and other small animals are returned to good health and then placed in secure and loving vetted homes"

Looking forward to November, there are a couple of significant dates:

13th November – Remembrance Day at the RAF Chapel and Biggin Hill War Memorial, the services will run concurrently this year not as in previous years where the Chapel has preceded the wreath laying at the War Memorial.

26th November will see the Biggin Hill Xmas lights being switched on, the airport has once again sponsored the lights

The transfer of the RAF Chapel from the Defence Infrastructure Organisation to the London Borough of Bromley is expected very soon, the Biggin Hill Memorial Museum Trust has been working hard to ensure the transfer is a smooth one especially for the regular parishioners of both the Saturday and Sunday services. The trust has recently been able to confirm that a Heritage Lottery Fund application for just under £2m has been successful at stage one of the process (80% of all successful stage one application achieve funding) which is fantastic news for the project. MONTHLY REPORT FROM THE OFFICE OF WILL CURTIS

October was a good month for business jet traffic with movements up on the same period last year. The weather has remained unseasonably warm with little rain, so light aviation did reasonably well too. The ILS glideslope was finally repaired and recommissioned in mid-October after 2 ½ months of unserviceability due to lack of suitable spare parts. It is our intention to upgrade the ILS next summer to a new system, but these are built to order so it was not a "quick fix" for the problem we recently encountered.

The Noise and Track Keeping System is now installed and gathering data. A few more tweaks are required and then we will be able to "go live". There are some users of aircraft with variable pitch props who are going to find their current mode of operation becomes very expensive indeed as they regularly bust the noise limits on departure. Best practice for noise abatement dictates that propeller RPM should be reduced as soon as safe and practical. If in doubt as to how to minimise noise on the ground, please book a flight with an instructor. If you are not able to safely reduce RPM after departure and you consequently exceed the agreed noise limits, then you may perhaps no longer be able to operate from Biggin Hill once the NMTKS goes live. The good news is that there no aircraft types currently operating from Biggin Hill that cannot easily comply if the right operating technique and climb profile is adopted.

We will be discussing the runway 29/11 consultation results at the next Tenants and Users meeting, which takes place Tuesday 8th November 2016 at 1230 in the Mortimer Room in the main terminal building. Please feel free to attend if you own, operate of fly an aircraft from Biggin Hill and have something constructive to add to the debate. We have received many responses, a summary of which will be available at the meeting.

The new runway 03 GPS approach continues through the formal ACP process. Feedback from the initial stakeholder consultation led to some amendments to the proposed approach. Due to some minor changes to the approach track south west around the M25/M23 junction area, we are going to have to run a second stakeholder consultation in mid-November for a period of 6 weeks. This will likely delay the implementation of the new approach until Q2 of 2017. We will keep you posted.

Last month I suggested that you got that final flight in before the winter months, but looking out of the window this morning, with wall to wall sunshine, I think that suggestion still stands.
