MONTHLY REPORT FROM THE OFFICE OF WILL CURTIS

October has been another average month for both business and light aviation. The effect of Brexit has been to dampen market enthusiasm and we will have to see how this will affect the business over the coming 6 months.

Work is continuing on the installation of the runway 03 approach lighting array with lighting gantries being constructed off site and tree cutting nearing completion. Bids have been received in respect of the repair work on Hotel taxiway and these are being evaluated as I

write. The hotel moves forward as we enter the final phase of appointing an operating partner. After that we will finalise design and tender the build of the hotel to suitable contractors. We still expect construction to commence in the early part of next year.

We have put much effort into reaching a conclusion with regard to the proposed Light Aviation Centre. We have received two proposals in respect of this project and we are evaluating these. At a recent Airport Safety Review Board meeting it was noted that the vast majority of risk surrounding airport operations remains with light aviation. We have a stated policy of reducing light aviation to 12-15,000 annual movements and we continue to move towards this goal. In the first three quarters of 2018, the airport hosted 19,900 light aircraft movements, so there remains a further reduction to be achieved if we are to reach the level of light aviation that we believe to be both safe and sustainable in the long term. At the recommendation of the Airport Safety review Board, airport management will shortly be reviewing progress made to date and considering additional measures designed adjust light aircraft activity in order to meet the stated targets.

There has been only one notable safety incident at the airport since I last wrote involving a pilot undertaking a night flight during which the pilot became seriously disoriented. At this time of year, many of you will be considering a night flying mission. If you have not flown at night within the recent past, may I suggest that you consider engaging the services of a flying instructor for the first night time excursion in order to be completely confident that the conditions will not overwhelm you causing a similar issue.
