CABAIR

We have known for some time that the new number crunchers who had acquired Cabair had indicated that they intended to close the Cabair training centres around the UK to concentrate on their professional training schools in the UK and the USA. But just this week (Wednesday 28th) we have found that schools suddenly closed their doors across the whole Cabair Group.

The situation is far from clear at the point of writing this Newsletter, with various rumours circulating that they have gone bust, or into receivership, etc. The various groups on the internet seem to indicate that all PPL centres have definitely closed, and even the professional schools in the USA and Cranfield have ceased operations.

At this point one of the most sensible reports circulating is that the Banks (them again!!) have forced the closure and that talks are underway to restructure the Group and that they have been given a fortnight to come up with a full restructure plan. It seems that it is hoped that the professional schools could be saved, but no one seems to hold out much hope for the PPL centres to survive. Once again, I stress that this is just rumour and conjecture, although it seems a likely scenario. Hopefully we will know more by next month's Newsletter, and we will keep you informed.

THE CHERRY LODGE GOLF CLUB DEVELOPMENT

As reported in the Mid Month Special Newsletter, the Bromley Council seems to have woken up to the fact that their handling of the planning permission application for this development was going to affect many people's quality of life, and the entire traffic situation in the Biggin Hill area that would affect thousands of regular road users. It seems that they have had it pointed out to them by the many action groups, and people like us, that the proper procedures may well have not been completely and correctly followed.

Within days of that Newsletter and articles in the local papers, planning notice signs started to appear on telegraph poles and the like all around the affected area, and the deadline for objections was immediately extended to 10th October to allow anyone affected to appeal again the plans being approved.

Well done to all who were active in bringing this to our attention. And please do write in to Bromley Council with your views on this proposed development. As previously published last month in the "special" Newsletter - The formal Planning Application at Bromley is Reference Number 11/02499/FULL1

It describes the application as: "Improvement of golf club course including deposit of inert materials to remodel 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th, 7th, 8th, 10th, 11th, 12th, 13th and 14th holes and provide multi-shot driving range (on existing practice ground outfield), chipping academy and putting green. Replacement single storey driving range building. Laying out of hard surface on existing informal car parking area to provide 93 spaces. Drainage and landscaping works. Alteration of vehicular access to Main Road and construction of temporary haul roads and compound for import of soil, including wheel washing facility, site office and related buildings - Cherry Lodge Golf Club Jail Lane Biggin Hill TN16 3AX "

There were also two 45 minute flying displays that were excellent, albeit short in duration, by such types as the P51 Mustang, Sea Fury, Twisters, and the Brietling Wingwalkers, as well as a beautifully executed display by Dan Griffith in the Biggin Hill based Kent Spitfire.

Attendance was fairly light, variously estimated at 2000 to 3000 people, many others having obviously been put off by the forecast for adverse weather. But all in all, a successful event – once again as long as people do not try to compare it with a full bloodied air show.
