Debbie is survived by her parents, Donald and Veronica, who reside in Fiji, and her Brother, Barry, who lives in Australia, and loving husband and Biggin Hill'ite, Steve.

Debbie's funeral is to be held at Eltham Crematorium on 16th October 2018, at 9:15am for a 9:45am start, and afterwards at the Tatsfield Social Club, from 11am. AIRPORT UNVEILS LIGHT AVIATION CENTRE PLANS

The Biggin Hill Airport Management unveiled this month their plans for the new Light Aviation Centre to be located near to the A3 hold and the Milking Lane entrance. With very quick and easy access to both ends of the runway, and fantastic views across London, the airport's plans

include a large aircraft parking ramp, with adjacent grass parking for aircraft, it is planned to have refuelling facilities, Customs, space for training organisations, and restaurant and social club/bar.

Dependent upon the airport attracting a suitable build and management partner, it would be a major step forward for light aircraft up to 2,730Kgs both based and visiting. We await with interest the development timescales.

MONTHLY REPORT FROM THE OFFICE OF WILL CURTIS

September has been an average month for business aviation and light aviation alike and perhaps slightly behind budget after several months if over budget performance. It remains to be seen where we end up once all the numbers are in.

There is little new to report since last month, but there have been a few safety incidents attributable to light aviation, although these have mainly involved visiting aircraft. Controlled airspace infringements continue to be an issue for light aviation with the London Gatwick Zone the primary target and Biggin Hill ATZ a close second. Proper flight planning will obviously reduce the risk of CAS infringements, so please ensure that you know your intended route and landmarks before departure.

Furthermore, several based aircraft have sadly fallen foul of the noise abatement procedures and have been identified by the Noise Monitoring & Track Keeping System, leading to a surcharge. I must stress that, together, we have made massive improvements over the past 24 months and we must not lose sight of this positive trend. Nevertheless, at the risk of repeating myself, I appeal to all parties to ensure that the noise abatement procedures are adhered to in the interests of us all. Thank you, in advance, for your help and cooperation in this important area of good neighbourliness.

The runway 03 approach continues to make its way through the CAA Airspace Change Process and we are hopeful of good news before too much longer. Meanwhile, work is well underway to install the approach lighting array with the lighting system now being built off site and the land preparation and tree cutting nearly completed. The Hotel taxiway tender is out with contractors and we expect bids back shortly after which we can appoint a contractor for this very expensive investment in our airport infrastructure. We hope works will begin this autumn as planned.

Sadly, the best of the summer weather is behind us and we must start thinking about winter operations. Accordingly, we are presently conducting de-icing refresher training and dusting off and servicing the winter kit so that we can keep the airport operation throughout the winter months.

Don't forget to ensure your aircraft is ready for colder temperatures. This may mandate a check of the tyre pressures, a change of engine oil grade or other winter preparation. Consult your maintenance organisation to ensure that your aircraft is ready to face less clement autumn weather - it's on its way!
